Gonzaga Recruits in Germany; 'Ruler' to Carry 133 Pounds

SPOKANE, June 24.—(AP)—The Gonzaga University Bulldogs, who picked up a 7-foot-3 basketball player in France last year, now have landed a 6-2 sharpshooter in Germany.

Coach Hank Anderson said today the latest catch is Frank Burgess, 23, a native of Arkansas who was spotted by a former Gonzaga student in an Air Force tournament in Germany.

Burgess averaged 34.2 points a game last year for an Air Force team at Hahn, Germany. He has enrolled in Gonzaga summer school as a sophomore after his service discharge.

Burgess is counted on to develop into a "feeder" for big Jean Claude Lefebvre, the towering sophomore from Paris.

SURPRISE ENTRY—NEW YORK, June 24.—(AP)—Bold Ruler is a surprise entry for the \$25,000-added Stymie Handicap tomorrow at Belmont Park.

The Chicago White Sox finally have put Manager Al Lopez' formula for success to work: If you can't score many runs yourself, don't let the other guy score any.

It sounds tough, but that's just what the Sox pitching staff has been doing lately. Ray Moore loaded another shutout on the American League-leading New York Yankees last night with a three-hitter that gave Chicago

a 2-0 victory and a share of fourth place.

The defeat cut the Yanks' lead to 7½ games over second-place Kansas City. The A's whipped Washington, 7-2, and retained their one-game lead over the third-place Detroit Tigers, who defeated Baltimore, 3-1, in the only other game scheduled.

Rookie Halts Giants

In the National League, a rookie, Carleton Willey, tossed a six-hit shutout as the

Milwaukee Braves defeated San Francisco, 7-0, and padded their first-place lead over the Giants to 2½ games. St. Louis moved into a third-place tie with Cincinnati by beating Pittsburgh, 7-5, while the Redlegs rapped Los Angeles, 8-1, in the only other game scheduled.

Moore, now 4-1, gave up nothing but singles, none after the fourth inning, and walked two while striking out five. The Sox moved into a tie with idle Boston, a game

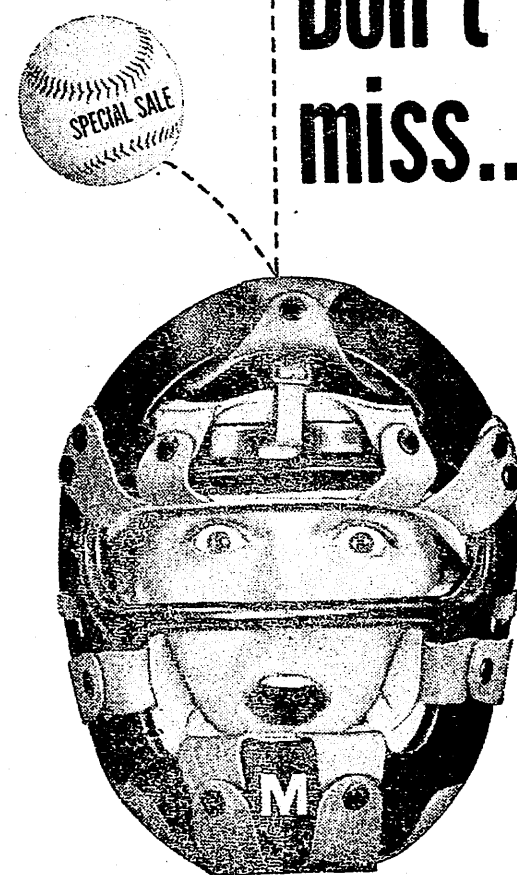
