Greer Wins Fourth P. G. A. Title

TACOMA, June 30. — Someone looked up and said, "Here comes the tank." And, sure enough, over the hill rolled Joe Greer, a little tank from Yakima, en route to an easy victory over his peers.

Greer chugged over the rolling hills of Fircrest, churned through its sand and stayed clear of its menacing timber for a one-sided triumph over the area's best pros yesterday in the Pacific Northwest tournament of the Professional Golfers' Association.

Greer's 70-70-140 was two strokes under par, three strokes better than his near-

est challengers and good enough for his fourth Pacific Northwest P. G. A. title.

Greer, whose 165 pounds are jammed into 5 feet 7 inches, played the steadiest round of the day with four birdies and two bogeys. And he did it despite trouble in several sand traps.
