Six Umpires Call Plays In N.W. League Game

KENNEWICK, June 22.—(AP)—In a Northwest League first, all six umpires of the Class B baseball circuit were used in last night's game between Wenatchee and Tri-City.

No one ever heard of it happening before in a lower-classification league.

Umpires Scotty Harris and Harry Schreiber had been assigned to work the game, the only one scheduled. The other umpires, en route to new assignments, stopped over here and decided on a "busman's holiday." They

asked of work rather than watch.

So... just like in the World Series, six men-in-blue called the plays.

Harris was behind the plate and Schreiber at first. Jim Centineo was stationed at second and Wes Crossley along the left-field foul line.

They were on their way to Salem. Lou Shiley, at third, and Gary Schmidt, right field, were headed for Yakima.

The sheer weight of numbers kept disputed decisions to a minimum.

Atlanta Is Offered N.F.L. Franchise

NEW YORK, June 22.—(AP)—Atlanta will become the 15th team in the National Football League in 1966, with a group headed by Rankin Smith, Jr., Atlanta insurance man, as the likely owner.

Commissioner Pete Rozelle will screen the four or five applicants with the understanding that a lease on the new \$18 million stadium is a must.

Although the rival American Football League voted a 1966 franchise to the Cox Broadcasting Corp. of Atlanta on June 8, the nine-man Stadium Authority reportedly is overwhelmingly in favor of the N. F. L. Arthur Montgomery, chairman of the board, has set a

July 1 deadline for a decision on the lease.

"WE FEEL there is very, very strong sentiment in Atlanta and the state of Georgia for an N. F. L. franchise," Rozelle said after announcing the award of the franchise yesterday by a unanimous vote.

Joe Foss, A. F. L. commissioner who was in New York for a meeting with his league's expansion committee, commented:

"All I can say is congratulations to the N. F. L.," and added that the problem of getting the A. F. L. into Atlanta rests with the Cox group.

This is the first step in a major expansion by the N. F. L., which will have 16 teams in 1967, divided into two conferences, each split into two divisions.

The sophomores at Longacres will take over tomorrow where they left off Sunday.

The feature on the ten-race twilight card is the \$1,400 Snoqualmie Purse, a 6-furlong allowance dash for 3-year-olds. Topping the past weekend were two divisions of the Tacoma Handicap.

Seven young Thoroughbreds will go after the Snoqualmie's top money. All but Lindo, to be ridden by Jack Palmer, have raced here this meeting.

First post parade will be 4:15 o'clock.

STALLION STAKES—The \$7,500-added Washington Stallion Stakes, a race unique on the American turf, has drawn a record 79 nominations for its 15th running at Longacres Sunday.

The first "closing" occurred more than three years before the race. On February 15, 1962, there were 44 stallions standing in the state, which were nominated at \$100 each.

It is their offspring, foals of 1963, which were eligible to be nominated by the June 15, 1965, deadline. Twenty-eight stallions are represented in the final count.

The list of 79 nominees tops the 74 named for the '64 renewal.

Petersen Wins N. W. Pro Golf Crown

Camera-shy Jim Petersen, fighting an unwarranted case of jitters, won the Northwest Professional Golfers' Association championship yesterday at Glendale Golf and Country Club.

The muscular Oregonian from Hillsboro was five under par for the 36-hole test, with rounds of 68 and 71.

knocked the ball out of bounds. I lost the tournament.

"Today, when the photographer appeared, I thought, 'Here we go again.' It wasn't his fault. I shouldn't be like that, but I couldn't help it."

UNTIL THEN, Petersen had played flawlessly. He carded eight birdies and nary a bogey, taking only 26 putts during the morning round.

"That's the best putting I've ever done in my life," he said.

Petersen, who pocketed \$450, and Bies, who earned \$300 for second place, both qualified for the national P. G. A. tournament.

They shared the spotlight, however, with Les Moe of Yakima and Jim Bourne of Tacoma, both of whom scored holes-in-one. Moe aced the 165-yard 15th, using a 4-iron. Bourne sank his with a 5-iron on the 175-yard 11th after his club bounced off a rock beneath the surface of the green.

Moe's hole-in-one was his first in 29 years of golf, Bourne's his first in 20 years of playing the game.

Ben Doyle of Broadmoor won the first alternate spot to the national P. G. A. in a play-off with Bob Duden of Portland and Duke Matthews of Wenatchee. The trio had tied at 145, one stroke behind Bies. Doyle parred the first extra hole. Duden and Matthews both bogeyed.

Tom Marlowe of Portland, the defending champion, shot 78-88-166, highest score in the entire field.
