# Sounders extend Buttle's contract

Steve Buttle's contract with the Seattle Sounders has been extended through next year's North American Soccer League season

to November.

Buttle, a midfielder who joined Seattle in 1977, nearly has left the club twice this year. This past winter he considered returning to Eng-land to fulfill a lifelong dream of playing in the First Division, Norwich City.

thwarted his efforts to obtain a "green card" (permanent United States residency) from immigra-tion officials, so he remained here with the Sounders. He also said he felt more opportunities existed in America for his daughter, age 3.

After starting a team-record 115

straight games, he was left off the traveling squad for a trip to Calgary earlier this season. He discussed a trade to San Jose discussed a trade to San Jose where he would be reunited with Jimmy Gabriel, his first Seattle coach, and possibly would regain a starting spot.
"I'm glad it didn't work out," said Buttle, who soon resumed starting for Seattle.
