SENATORS, NEW THREAT, DEFEAT LEADERS AGAIN

The rest of the American League finally has succeeded in getting the proper respect from the St. Louis Browns, but now the circuit has a new wracking crew.

The Washington Senators, who last week temporarily deposed the Detroit Tigers from the American League lead, knocked the Cleveland Indians off the top perch yesterday.

Bucky Harris' Senators are doing their bit to keep the race in the junior circuit uncertain. They climbed from the cellar to sixth place with their 8-6 decision yesterday, the second straight over Cleveland.

Big Sid Hudson, the rookie graduate from a Class D league, pitched hitless ball for five innings and allowed the Tribe only seven safeties in all.

The Browns, who were getting into everybody's hair through May and June, suffered their thirteenth consecutive defeat as Joe Cronin and Jim Tabor led the Boston Red Sox to a 10-6 victory. Cronin hit a homer and a single and Tabor three singles to pace a fifteen-hit offensive.

Detroit nosed out the Philadelphia Athletics, 9-8 to regain first place. Eight of the Tigers' runs were crammed into the fourth inning when Hank Greenberg hit his seventeenth homer with two on, but it took a later clutch clout by Rudy York to decide the game.

The Chicago White Sox halted a four-game winning parade by the New York Yankees with a 3-2 victory. Lefty Ed Smith held the champs to five hits for seven innings and when New York finally chased him in the eighth it was too late.

The Cincinnati Reds won another one run verdict, their fourth in six games, 3-2, over the Phillies, and lengthened their margin over the second-place Brooklyn Dodgers to three full games. Bucky Walters held the tail-enders to five hits in acquiring his thirteenth victory.

The Dodgers divided a doubleheader at Pittsburgh, winning the first 10-1, and losing the second, 4-3. Whitlow Wyatt spaced ten hits effectively and hit a home run, double and single in the first game. The Pirates pounced on 'St. Press' for four runs in the second and third frames of the nightcap and held on to win.

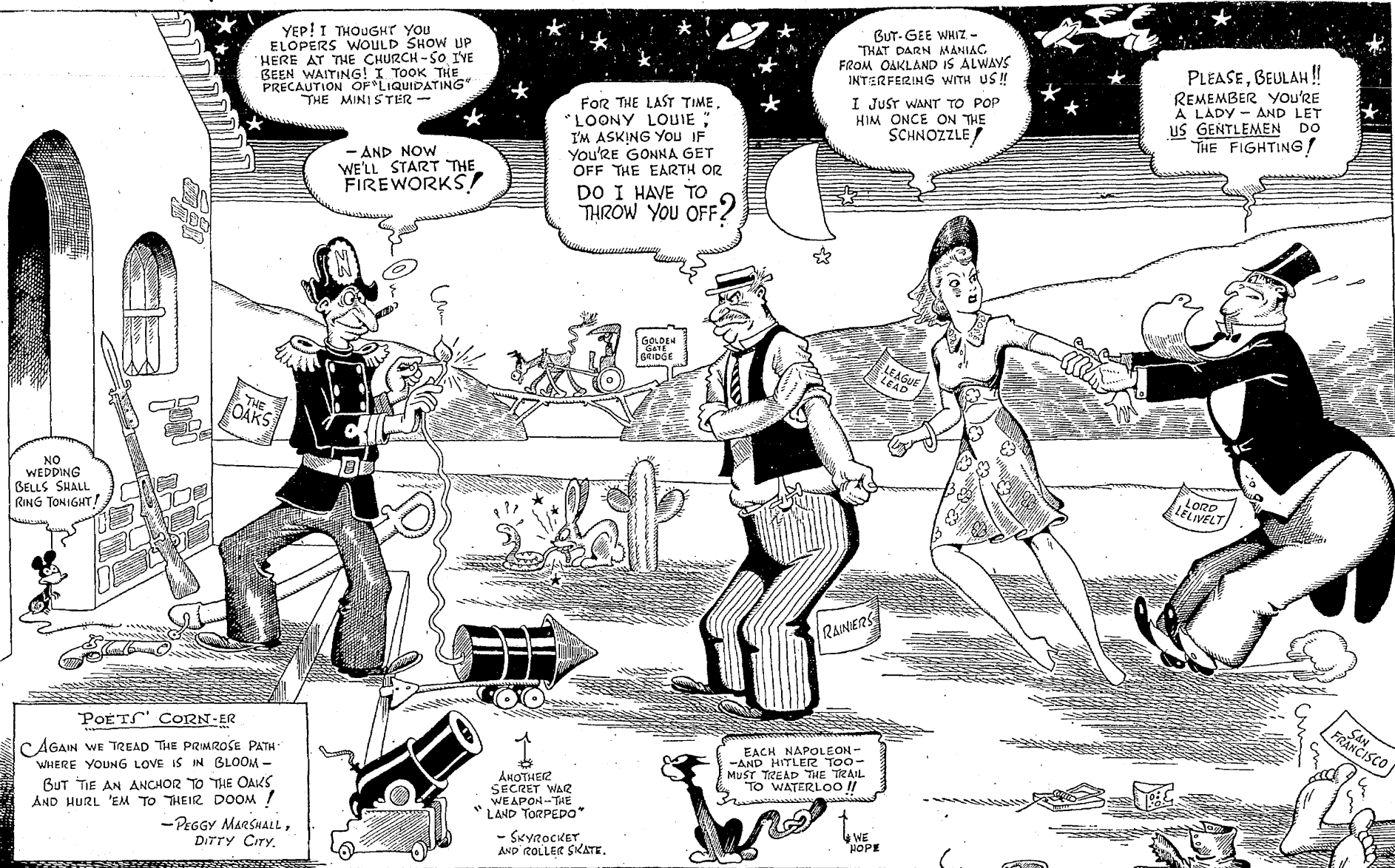
The New York Giants were fulfilled as they dropped a 5-3 game to the Chicago Cubs. The Terrible Terryman made fifteen hits, but left sixteen runners stranded. They had the game tied at 2-2 when Hank Leiber came to bat in the last half of the seventh and hit a home run with two on.

The St. Louis Cardinals massacred the Boston Bees, 12-2, with a twenty-hit bombardment led by Ernie Koy, Mickey Owen and Joe Orenco.

Red Cross Tilts Fail To Attract

SACRAMENTO, Tuesday, July 16.—

Adding a Monday game to each of last week's series in the Pacific Coast League was a splendid gesture, but didn't raise as much money for the Red Cross as was expected.

The biggest crowd of the night turned out in San Francisco to watch the Seals lose to the Seattle Rainiers. A crowd of 4,453 saw the Rainiers increase their league lead to eight full games over the second-place Oakland A's.

The Oaks took a bad beating here, 11 to 0, before 591 full price customers and 288 fanettes, who twirled the turnstiles free of charge.

Twelve hundred saw San Diego beat Los Angeles in the southern part of the circuit, and Hollywood's loss to Portland in the Movie City netted \$1,120, with 1,876 customers paying.

WILKIE SCORES VICTORY NO. 9 IN SEAL FINALE

SAN FRANCISCO, Tuesday, July 16.—It's just a matter of simple arithmetic... if the Seattle Rainiers lose all seven games against the Oakland A's this week they'll still be leading the Pacific Coast Baseball League.

Manager Jack Lovell of the Coast League champions saw to that last night when he tossed his southpaw ace, Aldon Wilkie, against the San Francisco Seals as all eight clubs in the circuit did their bit for the Red Cross by adding an extra game to last week's series.

Wilkie trounced the Seals for the second time in a week by scattering seven hits to beat them, 4 to 0, while the Oaks took a trimming in Sacramento, 11 to 0. Now the A's are eight games behind, so they can't possibly catch up this week, which means the Rainiers across the bridge for a week's stand in Emeryville.

When the Rainiers came to town last Tuesday they were protecting a nine-game winning streak, while Pitchers Hal Turpin and Wilkie both were protecting individual records.

Turpin and the Rainiers tumbled in the series opener when Farmer Hal lost a 1-to-0 duel, but Wilkie picked up a pair of victories so he now has nine straight to his credit, without a defeat charged against him this season.

The Rainiers dropped the first two games and then trimmed the Seals six in a row. They'll be seeking to run that streak up a bit against the Oaks.

Wilkie will see but little more action this week. His turn to work won't come until next Sunday afternoon and he may even skip that, for the Oaks are tough medicine for southpaws. They present an almost solid front of right-handed hitters, Outfielder Marv Gudat being the only exception.

Lovell might even save his two lefties, Wilkie and Bill Walker, for relief chores only and let the right-handers handle all seven assignments.

Bill Schuster, the gabby shortstop, was both the hero and clown of last night's victory. He reached first base four times in a row and scored two runs with his dashing on the base paths. Then he got himself shoed to the clubhouse with his antics in the eighth when he fanned with the bags groaning.

Gilly Campbell singled in the second run and scored Seattle's first run when Shortstop Nanny Fernandez erred on a double-play ball.

Al Epperly, the Seals' starting hurler, walked Schuster in the fifth, Bill Lawrence sacrificed, and Schuster ambled home as catcher Joe Sprink threw the ball into left field after recovering a short passed ball.

In the seventh, Schuster coaxed a walk again, after 10-10, while he had singled infield, Bill Lawrence fouled out, Spence Harris doubled to left center, scoring White, and when the play at second was close on Harris, Schuster broke for the plate and beat a hurried throw.

Seal hopes in the ninth were dashed when Wilkie turned Al Wright's hot grounder into a double play that wiped out Don White's single.
